The Second Time Around

Ten years has passed since my first experience as Iowa ACAC President and I have found the "second time around" to be both very similar and very different. I guess that should be exactly what one would expect. An Association is a living, breathing organism because it is made up of living, breathing organisms. People! And, like people, it grows and changes just as the society in which it lives grows and changes.

One of the first obvious differences is the people with whom I have shared this leadership experience. I worked with only three of the fifteen current board members ten years ago, and only one of those was in an Iowa ACAC leadership position at that time. I point this out because that is a sign of a healthy, growing organization. Old leadership must be willing to move into other roles so that new leadership can emerge and create new ideas and new challenges. If that experienced leadership has done its job, those new leaders will reflect the ideals of that generation and build upon the successes in new and creative ways.

Another difference that I have noted is the increase in our high school counselor membership. In the last decade, this was one of our long range plan priorities. Our high school member involvement in events like The R.I.D.E. and the Visit the Hill Program has grown significantly in ten years. And to a lesser degree, we are seeing more high school counselors attending our lowa ACAC Conference, MIDWest Conference, and even the NACAC Conference. While I was pleased with this change, I am still convinced that we can do more to increase the number of high school counselors who are part of our organization and more importantly, part of our leadership structure. An increase in membership from any homogeneous group demands an increased awareness in the needs of that group if we are to continue that growth. I would like to see a day when our executive board and committees are made of up an equal part of admission professionals and high school counselors to ensure that we have an ear tuned to the needs of our full membership.

I see a continued commitment by Iowa ACAC to cultivate strong relationships with our neighboring Affiliates. The expansion of our Tri-State Conference into our MIDWest Conference has been a tremendous benefit to our membership. The increased sharing of programs with Iowa School Counselor Association is also very encouraging. I am excited by the willingness of our members to be involved in the NACAC committees and the NACAC grant programs. I am impressed with the creation of our first high school scholarship program and the increase in our recognition awards for Iowa ACAC members who have gone above and beyond for our students.

But I see one thing that has not changed over the last ten years; that is the talent and dedication of our membership. The professionalism of our members is unmatched by any other organization. The energy and creativity still amazes me. We face a future that demands more from us today than it did ten years ago. But I am convinced that Iowa ACAC is in good health and in good hands!

COLLEGE POSSIBLE

College Possible is a non-profit organization focused on college access and success for low-income high school students across the country. Students involved with College Possible are dedicated to the idea of a college degree, but might not achieve their goal of a college degree without extra assistance. College Possible provides intensive coaching for high school juniors and seniors as they prepare to transition to college, supporting them all the way through to college graduation. AmeriCorps members serve as coaches and guide students through the college search and preparation process through after-school sessions for two hours twice a week, with students completing over 320 hours of curriculum with a group of college-bound peers.

Unfortunately, the "senior slump" can be all too real! Try these tips for helping your students get remotivated:

• Focus on wellness: Being in a good place physically and mentally is key to success in other areas of life. Make sure your students are eating healthy, exercising, and finding ways to destress outside the classroom whether that be reading, spending time with friends, or going for a run.

• Avoid overbooking: Overscheduling can be overwhelming. Encourage your students to budget their time wisely—this can be hard for high school students who have friends, family, work, and school to pull them in different directions. The simple act of learning to make, and prioritize, a to-do list can be extremely helpful. If they learn time management now, it will be an invaluable skill for college and beyond. • Celebrate the student: Between school, work, extracurricular activities, AND making a college decision, life can get stressful. Remind your students to take time to celebrate their successes here and now—an "A" on a math test, winning the big game Friday night, earning a college scholarship.

• Heading to college?: After making a decision on where to attend college, some students think they're free and clear to coast until graduation. Wrong! When reviewing final high school transcripts, most colleges expect students to maintain their grades throughout senior year. Colleges are able to renege on an offer of admission—or on a scholarship offer—if a student does not uphold the appropriate marks.

PROGRAM SEASON

All colleges and universities have their own unique admission cycles and seasons, but one area of common ground among college admission counselors is admitted student programs. In anticipation of hundreds, if not thousands, of new freshmen arriving on our campuses in the fall, we are all working hard to host these students and their families as they make their final enrollment decisions during the spring months. This can feel like a stressful time period as we work long hours and endure lengthy conversations and interactions in our efforts to yield the students we've admitted, but it can also be a very humbling and exhilarating experience.

Consider how much time we have recently spent judging our applicants. Perhaps "judging" isn't the ideal word to use here, but it can't be denied that we have been looking over our applicants' credentials from top to bottom as we decide who we would like to have join our communities and who we would prefer to keep out. It is important to remember that just as those students had to sit and wait for us to decide if they met our [often complex and multifaceted] standards, we must now wait to see if our communities make the cut for the students we have admitted.



That is the humbling bit: our schools are just a few of the many schools out there, not just in Iowa, but in the Midwest and the entire country, from coast to coast. And if we liked a student enough to admit him or her, then it is very likely that that student was well-liked—and admitted—at several other schools.

The spring months leading up to our deposit deadlines can also be tremendously exhilarating. We have worked hard all year to recruit a dynamic and talented freshman class. Every year, we strive to meet higher goals and to recruit the most impressive candidates for admission, and the hours we spent in high school gymnasiums, cafeterias, and guidance offices are finally starting to pay off in a visible way. We have worked with students from start to near-finish of the admission cycle, and we have fought for them in our admission committees. The weeks leading up to Deposit Day complete the final chapter in the novel of our yearlong recruitment efforts; it is nearly time to celebrate our successes!

This three-day bus tour provides a door-to-door, first-hand look at post-secondary campuses and what each school has to offer students. Each year, high school counselors are chauffeured to a variety of colleges for tours, handson learning, meals and even overnight stays in on-campus residence halls or apartments. All transportation, meals, and lodging are taken care of by the host colleges, lowa ACAC, and our partnership with ISCA!

To quote one of last year's participants: "The RIDE is the most beneficial high school counselor staff development I've discovered in the past six years. Besides the college tours and information, the RIDE provides me a great chance to network with other counselors throughout the state... something one can never do enough."

Registration will open in April on the Iowa ACAC website, and all participants are required to pay a \$25 non-refundable registration fee to hold their spot. All schools represented by registrants who participate in the RIDE will receive a one year institutional Iowa ACAC membership for their whole office. International CONNECTION

lowa Sister States (ISS) is a volunteer driven organization dedicated to connecting lowans with the world community. Their mission is to provide international programs that promote the interests of lowans abroad. They do this by facilitating and hosting exchange programs between lowa and our Sister States which include, Yamanashi Prefecture, Japan, Yucatan, Mexico, Hebei Province, China, Terengganu, Malaysia, Stavropol Krai, Russia, Taiwan, Cherkasy Oblast, Ukraine, Veneto Region, Italy, and Kosovo.

The Republic Kosovo, being the newest of the Iowa Sister States, just announced the grand opening of its Consulate Office in Des Moines, Iowa on Friday, Jan. 29th 2016. This will be the first foreign diplomatic office to be located in Iowa. Kosovo chose Iowa as a place to open their Consulate due to the strong civilian and military ties between Iowa and Kosovo. The Iowa/ Kosovo relationship began in 2011, when the Iowa National Guard was partnered with the Kosovo Security Force via the National Guard Bureau's State Partnership Program. Iowa's Adjutant General Tim Orr envisioned a "Whole of Iowa to the Whole of Kosovo" approach to the relationship. In 2013, Iowa Governor Terry Branstad and Kosovo's President Atifete Jahjaga signed a sister state agreement joining the State of Iowa and the Republic of Kosovo. The Iowa Sister States have many opportunities for current students in Iowa colleges, like scholarship opportunities that could lead you abroad to be a representative for the State of Iowa. Most recently ISS announced the Jeff Zimpleman ISS Scholarship, which is unique because it is specifically for Iowa students to further their interest in the world of international relations via one of Iowa's 9 sister state relationships. It offers scholarship opportunities for Iowan's seeking degrees/diplomas in the area of international business or agriculture, international relations, language, or culture(including music, art, and film.)

Many lowa colleges also participate with the lowa Sister States by collaborating and offering scholarship opportunities/ professional development to international students studying from one of the sister states.
